1. One of Ignatius Donnelly's popular novels. It has been variously categorized as science fiction, speculative fiction, dystopian fiction, and/or apocalyptic fiction Caesar's Column

- **2.** American Populist orator and politician whose fiery appeals for Kansas farmers to 'raise less corn and more hell' made her a national figure during the early 1890s Marry Lease
- **3.** It traveled around the world from 1907 to 1909 to demonstrated U.S. naval power, showing it was of comparable strength to other major powers and empires of the time **The White Fleet**
- **4.** It authorized the Interstate Commerce Commission to regulate railroad pricing and sought to end the practice of railroads offering rebates to preferred companies **The Hepburn Act 1906**
- **5.** U.S. dissident political faction that nominated former president Theodore Roosevelt as its candidate in the presidential election of 1912 **The Bull Moose Party**
- **6.** In 1896, in unabashed defiance of the 15<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Constitution, Louisiana passed it in order to keep former slaves and their descendants from voting **Grandfather Clause**
- 7. The decision in this Supreme Court case upheld a Louisiana law that allowed for 'equal but separate accommodations for the white and colored races'

  Plessy vs. Ferguson
- **8.** A proponent of a woman's legal and social equality during the 19<sup>th</sup> century. In 1848, she organized the first national woman's rights convention in Seneca Falls, New York

  Elizabeth C. Stanton
- **9.** Founded by Booker T. Washington in 1881 under a charter from the Alabama legislature for the purpose of training teachers in Alabama **Tuskegee Institute**
- **10.** Delivered by William Jennings Bryan, the speech advocated bimetallism. At the time, the Democratic Party wanted to standardize the value of the dollar to silver **The Cross of Gold Speech**
- **11.** Booker T. Washington's autobiography. It promoted a vision of racial harmony that required blacks to disregard their desires for racial equality **Up from Slavery**
- 12. The dried dung used as fuel, esp. by early settlers on the Great Plains **Buffalo Chips**
